

Dear Maryland Public Trails User:

We are the trade association for the Maryland horse industry, and we are writing you as a fellow user of our state's extensive system of public trails.

Most equestrians in Maryland are trail riders, and our members are increasingly concerned about the lack of safe access, for all user groups, to our shared natural resources. We know that other user groups share this concern, particularly as more Marylanders than ever are turning to outdoor recreation as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic.

We are considering legislative action on this issue and would welcome your participation and support. Specifically, we are considering a request that the Maryland Department of Natural Resources:

- require farmers (or others) leasing public land to maintain a 20-foot border around their fields for unrestricted access to trail heads – because we believe that public land is not "available" if there is no way to access it; and
- prohibit firearms on public land on one weekend day each week because we believe that public land is not "available" to the public if users risk, or fear the risk, of injury from weapons.

Please let us know if you would like to participate in group action on access to trails.

Our superb system of public trails is important to all Marylanders. We look forward to collaborating with you to keep them accessible and safe for all.

Letter from MHC's Presidents

We have been busy as bees here at MHC, winding down our summer study projects for the Government Relations Committee and preparing for the 2022 session of the General Assembly. Our task forces did yeomen's work, and we were able to present three new policy positions for a vote by the Board of Directors at the August 19 Quarterly Meeting.

Before we get to the policy positions, however, let's talk about the fact that for the second year in a row, Governor Hogan has declared October to be Maryland Horse Month. As Governor Hogan explained last year, "Mary-

land has historically led the nation in creating and growing innovative equestrian-related programs, from forming the first sporting organization in the colonies, the Maryland Jockey Club in 1743, to hosting the Maryland 5 Star, one of only seven events of this kind in the world," said Governor Hogan. "Maryland Horse Month will showcase the depth and breadth of the industry's impact on our history, heritage, and culture."

This year's Horse Month will be special, not only because we have the inaugural Maryland 5 Star at Fair Hill, and not only because the Capitol Challenge is back after

its COVID-year hiatus in Ohio, and not only because the Jim McKay Maryland Million is welcoming spectators back to Laurel Park, but also because-the Mustangs are coming!

Mustangs Are Coming to Maryland

Mustang enthusiasts Hannah Catalino and Lisanne Fear are riding 5,000 miles through 12 states with 4 Mustangs in one year, starting in late September in Lewes, Delaware. The goal of their cross-country Mustang Ride is to get 5,000 of the 53,000 Mustangs that are currently in holding pens adopted. The ride is being filmed as a documentary by the EQUUS Film Festival.

The Mustang Ride will arrive in Maryland on October 2, when it reaches the Celebration of the Horse event at Tuckahoe Equestrian Center in Queen Anne County. After Tuckahoe, the Mustang Ride will go to the Washington D.C. area and ride through Rock Creek Park before moving on to the C & O Canal.

Marylanders are welcome to join Catalino and Lisanne on their ride through the state. Ann Hanlin from Street, who staged a Mustang Challenge Show last month in Harford County, will be with them. Please come on out and participate–we'd love as many cameos of Maryland horse people in the documentary as possible. Contact Lisa Diersen at lisa@equusfilmfestival.net for details.

Other Horse Month activities include the ribbon cutting for the new Show Arena at the Baltimore County Agricultural Center on October 8, the National Jousting Association's National Tournament in Brunswick on October 9, Canter for the Cause at Pimlico on October 10, and the Military and Mounted Police Showcase at Fair Hill on October 16.

MHC Board Adopts Three New Policy Positions

MHC's Board of Directors establishes the policy positions upon which our legislative and regulatory work is based. This is an important role; indeed, it is the crux of our work as the trade association for the Maryland horse industry. The policy positions that the Board of Directors establish influence the Maryland General Assembly, state regulatory agencies, and local and municipal governments. At the August 19 meeting, the Board of Directors approved three new policy positions.

1. Access to Trails:

As we wrote in last month's letter, the Government Relations Committee convened a task force this summer to consider issues related to the shared use of public land. More Marylanders visited our public parks during 2020 than at any time in the past, in large part because the CO-VID-19 pandemic limited indoor recreational activities. The Department of Natural Resources reported that in 2020, more than 2 million Marylanders visited over 75 parks. Park rangers closed parks 292 times in 2020, triple the number of times parks closed due to over-capacity in 2019. In addition, the General Assembly created The State Park Investment Commission to study park capacity and to ensure that public lands remain accessible to all. The commission will be chaired by former Governor Parris Glendenning.

MHC is committed to ensuring that these capacity and accessibility *continued*...

concerns do not jeopardize access to our existing equestrian trails. As a result, the Executive Committee asked the Board of Directors to approve the following policy – which the Board did by unanimous vote:

The Maryland Horse Council supports legislation to require that farmers who lease public land must leave and maintain a 20-foot border around their crops to permit unobstructed access to trail heads, to encourage environmental best practices, and to allow first responders to reach people in need of assistance.

Now that the Board has approved this policy, our Government Relations Committee will begin drafting proposed legislation to introduce in the 2022 General Assembly. We have secured a potential Senate sponsor for the bill, and we will be working over the next few weeks to secure similar sponsorship in the House.

We have also reached out to non-equestrian trail users who might share our concerns, and who might support our efforts on the shared use of public land. Our outreach letter appears across from this page, and we encourage everyone to share it as widely as possible. We will post an electronic version on both *The Equiery* and Maryland Horse Council websites.

2. Equine-Assisted Therapy for Veterans:

In 2019, the Maryland General Assembly added "therapy horses" to the list of veterans' services that are reimbursable under the Service Animal Program. The current law limits eligibility to Professional Association of Therapeutic Horsemanship (PATH) Premier Accredited Centers (PAC), or programs that have Equine Assisted Growth and Learning Association (EAGALA) certified professionals on staff. Our members felt that these eligibility requirements were too restrictive, and that they effectively excluded deserving programs.

Earlier this summer, MHC created a task force to figure out how to expand the number of therapeutic riding facilities that qualify for veterans' services reimbursement funds. The task force concluded that the current law is not well-suited to the specific needs of the Maryland veterans' community, and it decided that a new eligibility protocol that took the best practices of PATH and EAGALA and modified them specifically for veterans was a better approach.

As a result, the Executive Committee asked the Board of Directors to approve the following policy – which the Board did by unanimous vote:

The Maryland Horse Council believes that equine-assisted therapy programs can provide invaluable services to eligible veterans, and that the Maryland Veterans Affairs Animal Services Program should be given legislative latitude to provide funds to as many qualified equine-assisted therapy programs as possible. As a result, the Maryland Horse Council supports replacing the current eligibility requirements with a Maryland-specific eligibility protocol designed to meet the specific needs of Maryland veterans.

Now that the Board has approved this policy, our Government Relations Committee will open discussions with the Maryland Veterans Administration to design a Maryland-specific eligibility protocol.

3. Helmet Law for Minors:

As we reported in last month's letter, Del. Mary A. Lehman (D – Anne Arundel & Prince George's) asked us if we would support legislation that would require minors to wear helmets when riding on public land. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has found that horseback riding resulted in 11.7 percent of all traumatic brain injuries in recreational sports from 2001 to 2005, the highest of any athletic activity. According to the Equestrian Medical Safety Association, head injuries account for an estimated 60 percent of the deaths resulting from equestrian accidents. In addition, the New England Journal of Medicine reports that helmets can reduce head and brain injuries by 85 percent. See American Association of Neurological Surgeons, Sports-Related Head Injury, available at https://www.aans.org/Patients/Neurosurgical-Conditions-and-Treatments/Sports-related-Head-Injury.

The Executive Committee surveyed MHC members about their views on a helmet law for minors. We asked: "Do you think Maryland law should mandate that minors wear ASTM-approved helmets when mounted and riding on public land?" Eighty-seven percent of our respondents said "yes," and 13% percent said "no." Of those who voted "no," the reasons were that such a law would be difficult to enforce, and that whether a child should wear a helmet should be a parental choice, not a legal requirement.

Because the majority of survey respondents supported such a law, the Executive Committee asked the Board to approve the following policy – which it did by unanimous vote:

The Maryland Horse Council supports legislation to require minors to wear ASTM/SEI-approved helmets when riding on public land.

Now that the Board has approved the helmet law policy, our Government Relations Committee will work with Del. Mary A. Lehman (D – Anne Arundel and Prince George's) on draft legislation.

* * * *

The fact that our summer study projects are winding down does not mean our work on these issues will stop. Our work on public land will shift to our standing Trails & Greenways Committee, and our work on therapy horses for veterans will shift to our standing Equine-Assisted Therapy Committee.



Jockey Club

Teen Jockey Tops Pimlico Standings At the conclusion of the extended Preakness Meet at Pimlico Racecourse, it was 18-year-old jockey Charlie Marquez who topped the jockey standings with 49 wins. A Maryland native, Marquez grew up in Columbia and spent his early childhood watching his mother gallop for trainers Mary Eppler and Jose Corrales. "I always wanted to be a jockey," Marquez said.

In 2020, Marquez had 58 wins to make him Maryland's leading apprentice jockey. This year, his wins graduated him to journeyman status on May 30. He earned his first career riding title with the Preakness Meet.

While Marquez scooped up the Preakness Meet jockey title, veteran trainer Claudio Gonzalez earned his second straight Preakness Meet trainer title this year, bringing his total career Maryland titles to 17. Highlights for Gonzalez from this year's Preakness Meet include wins with Harpers First Ride in the Deputed Testamony on July 31, and double stakes wins on April 24 with Miss Leslie winning the Weber City Miss and Completed Pass winning the King T. Leatherbury.

MD Horse Library Added to State's Horse Park System

On September 10, the Maryland Horse Industry Board designated the Maryland Horse Library and Education Center as the Educational and Cultural Center of the Maryland Horse Park System.

As part of the State's effort to enhance and increase interest in the Maryland horse industry, MHIB established the Maryland Horse Park System, which is made up of three venues: an outdoor and field equestrian competition facility, an indoor competition and exhibition arena and an educational and cultural center. MHIB commissioned the Maryland Stadium Authority to perform a study in 2011 to identify the locations for these facilities.

Upon conclusion of the study and improvements made to each facility, the Fair Hill Special Events Zone in Elkton was designated the outdoor and field equestrian competition venue and the Prince George's Equestrian Center was named the indoor competition and exhibition arena.

The newly renovated multi-faceted library in historic Reisterstown fulfills the need for the third location, the educational and cultural center. Construction began in September with the center opening to the public by spring 2022.

Dressage Young Rider Medalist

Maryland's Hannah Irons was a member of the Region 1 Silver Medal winning team at this year's North American Youth Championships, held August 10-15 in Traverse City, Michigan. Irons, who rides regionally with Potomac Valley Dressage Association, rode Scola Bella to sixth place individually in the Freestyle and 14th individually for the Individual Test.

Fellow Marylander Abigail Rowe also competed at NAYC this year as part of the Region 1 Junior team. She rode Freewill to 14th place individually and the team finished fifth overall.

Tornado Hits Fiddlers Folly

As the remnants of Hurricane Ida made their way up the East Coast, an F2 tornado struck several areas of Edgewater, including the western fields of Fiddlers Folly, managed by Amy Posey. The tornado touched down on September 1, a little after 2 pm and took out many fence lines and two run-in sheds. Posey reported that the damage is estimated at \$32,000. "Fortunately the tornado missed the farm's main barn, containing the 12 resident horses, by a mere 30 yards and all horses were unharmed," she said.

Posey and her barn staff and boarders had been busy planning the farm's first combined test to be held on September 11, but after staring at the wreckage, they started to think they should cancel the show. "There were shards of aluminum, broken boards, decimated sheds, and downed trees sprinkling the property,' Posey stated, adding, "We had 10 days and lots of help," so now the show will go on.

Over the course of those 10 days, Posey and a team of eight boarders mobilized to make the farm safe and presentable. "Once pictures continued...

of the damages were posted to Facebook, suddenly the show was over capacity and we were attempting to squeeze in last minute rides into every minute of the schedule," she explained. "In addition to the entries, sponsorships and donations from local businesses came flooding in. The community support was completely overwhelming."

New Safety Measures at Assateague

In an effort to reduce Asjuries and deaths due to vehicle

strikes, the State Highway Administration and Assateague State Park have made several changes within the national seashore.

Four speed bumps have been installed in the park's campground and crosswalks have been expanded. Additional caution and speed warning signs have been installed along the Route 611 causeway/park entrance road. The speed limit on the park entrance road across Verrazano Bridge has been lowered to 25 miles per hour, and the speed along the causeway and Bayberry Drive has been lowered to 15 miles per hour. The National Park Service has also added speed feedback signs, which display driver speeds along these roads.

In addition, the park hired additional seasonal rangers plus a team of two volunteer rovers to conduct pony patrol activities and to help move horses away from busy beach areas. The Maryland Park Service is also piloting the installation of campsite cooler storage bins to keep food where horses are less likely to be attracted to it.

These ongoing efforts are part of a "Give Wild Horses a Brake" outreach campaign that was launched on August 20 by Maryland First Lady

Reining Rule Changes

On August 22, the National Reining Horse Association Board of Directors unanimously approved two proposed rule changes that had been presented by the Non Pro Committee. Both changes will open up opportunities for Youth and Non Pro members.

The first rule change allows Youth members to work for NRHA Professionals. "By relaxing the restrictions on our young members, we have the opportunity to welcome even more youth into the industry," said Non Pro Committee Chair Ginger Schmersal. "Now kids who want to ride or learn to ride can go work for a trainer without having to worry about losing their Non Pro status."

The rule change adds that when a Youth member turns 19 years old, they will be able to make the decision to retain their Non Pro status or become a NRHA Professional member.

The second rule change allows Non Pro members to receive sponsorships and endorsements. These riders however, must abide by all other requirements of the Non Pro Conditions "restricting the receipt of remuneration for training or showing in any equine discipline or giving instruction on the showing or training of a performance horse," according to a recent NRHA press release.

"Without the allowance for advertisements and endorsements, collegiate reining athletes would have to deny endorsements and activities, become an NRHA Professional, or stop showing in NRHA," Schmersal explained. She added that every member of the Non Pro Committee felt that receiving free products does not give an exhibitor an advantage in the show pen and does not make the person receiving the products a professional trainer.

New Trail Etiquette Campaign

On August 25, Equine Land Conservation Resource (ELCR), a non-profit dedicated to protecting land for horses, along with a national coalition of trail user groups, announced the launch of the "Trails Are Common Ground" campaign to help "elevate the importance of respectful, inclusive, safe, and enjoyable experiences on trails."

According to a study commissioned by the Outdoor Industry Association, 8.1 million more Americans hiked on public park trails in 2020 over 2019. At the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, many trail system automated counters reported four times

as many users as during the same time frame in 2019. In addition, the Rails-to-Trails Conservancy reported a 79% spike in usage nationwide between March and July of 2020.

Advocacy groups and industry leaders began collaborating in February 2021 to discuss the need for this campaign. More than 15 meetings have been held with input from over 20 organizations as well as outdoor industry brands, land managers, representatives with BIPOC communities and adaptive trail users.

Imagine an island filled with all-black stallions and mares, dotted with quaint white villages, surrounded by turquoise waters and kissed by soft Mediterranean breezes, in a renowned ecological refuge, where there are more horses per capita than anywhere around...

"Well, that's our claim anyway," says Mateu Pons, owner of Algendar Rutes, a horseback excursions outfit in the Spanish island of Menorca, located in the western Mediterranean. "Other people from Europe have come to ride here and made the same claim about their town or region, but none have so many of such a unique breed as we have here."

Indeed, the Purebred Menorca Horse and its island of birth make the most beautiful of couples. It is nothing short of a marriage, a marriage of centuries, an historical marriage, and the stuff that equestrian dreams are made of. This became my unexpected dream vacation this summer.

Dark, handsome, brave and kind, the Menorca Horse is said to be descended from various Spanish island and mainland breeds, as well as from the breeds of the many invaders the centuries brought to this land. To ride the Menorcan Horse through his magical island is to live history, from the crystalline beaches that beckoned Phoenicians, Greeks and Carthaginians, through the still existing cobblestone routes of the Romans, past the influences of Moorish invasions, the kingdoms of Mallorca and Aragon, and beyond the remnants of French and English occupations. The significance of the names of farm estates, the stone walls along the paths, the castles in the distance, and the archaeological wonders, is laid out before you as you ride through on your majestic black stallion. And no, none of this is exaggeration or literary license.

The Menorcan Horse breed as it is today is

thought to be 200 years old, as it has been at the center of the island's holidays and festivities for that long at least. The Feast of St. John, held in June in the castle-topped city of Ciutadella, is the best known, but a stay in Menorca quickly divulges the true connection of the horse to its people: everybody and their cousin reports rearing on a Menorca stallion through the streets during summer festivities in their town! In fact, the traditional and spectacular "bots," in which the horses rear and walk or jump several feet on their hind legs while people reach out to touch them for good luck, is the pride and joy of every Menorcan's memory bank. "Look, this is me riding in the town of Ferreries' festivities, and this is my daughter's girlfriend doing the bot among the people as well," exclaims Biel Febrer, as he shows me videos and pictures on his phone, readily available at the touch of one button.


Febrer works in Menorca's renowned shoe industry and his memories are just as generous and ready and joyful as the original moments. The pride over the horses and the traditions of the island is palpable and infectious in everyone you meet; even our taxi ride to the airport divulged another "bot" rider. Sometimes even children ride in the festivities. "Everyone in Menorca is either from the sea and has a "llaut" (the typical Menorcan boat), or is from the land and has a Menorcan horse. Some families do both!" Mateu Pons proudly exclaimed.

That passion for the heritage of Menorca is how its endangered breed has evolved throughout the centuries, bred by the island's people for battle, for farming, for carriage driving, for festivities and for any task required, with colts kept as studs whenever possible to ensure its future. A breed association was formed in 1988 and a stud book in 2008, and the breed standard today is for an elegant and agile black horse that starts at about 15.1 hands. The average height I saw on the island was closer to 16 hands and slightly above, and I even got to ride a 17-hand, fouryear old stallion that might as well have been a rocking horse he was so safe. Only those that have been to an auction without their trailer or checkbook will know the relief I felt at having neither handy at that moment, but I cannot deny I'm still dreaming of that horse!

Incredibly sure-footed, they move like agile goats through the frequently rocky Menorcan landscape. Most of the stallions and geldings are worked in Menorcan dressage in traditional Menorcan tack - including a slightly highcantle saddle to hold you in while you do the "bot" - and all are extensively trail ridden. The breed is also starting to enter classical dressage in Spain and throughout Europe, with their incredibly docile and cooperative temperament being one of their most beloved traits.

Today, several of the island's breeders are working to grow beyond the estimated 3,000 registered horses and there are several trail-riding outfits on the island to familiarize tourists with the breed and the island's history. There is also an exhibition hall, Son Martorellet, that hosts a wonderful weekly show with live music, lights, classical dressage routines, work at liberty, and several demonstrations of Menorcan dressage with the traditional "bots."

If being on a beautiful island is not enough of a magical experience and opportunity to disconnect, imagine being a horseperson on such an island where horses are at the center of life there, to top it all off. Everywhere you drive, fields dotted with black horses. Everyone you speak to, a lover of horses. One cannot possibly live through such a unique experience without dreaming of return, so I'm already planning for an even deeper look into this unique island and its horses next summer. Who's coming with me?!







CAPITAL CHALLENGE HORSE SHOW Surviving and Thriving During the Pandemic

Imagine 10 days during which riders from all over the country descend on Maryland, flooding the economy with a staggering \$25 million worth of economic impact. From booked hotels and packed restaurants to supplies purchased from local vendors, the Capital Challenge Horse Show provides Maryland with a significant annual economic boost as well as providing the Hunter/Jumper world with the biggest horse show on the fall East Coast calendar.

In 2019, the show hosted 736 riders representing 49 states for a total of 1,133 entries. Over the course of the show, 43 division champions were crowned as well as 15 Grand Champions. Fifteen Leading Rider awards were handed out along with four National Medal Finals and 10 World Champion Hunter Rider National Champions. The 2019 show held an impressive 4,096 jump rounds.

In 2020, the Capital Challenge Horse Show was forced to move from its traditional home at the Prince George's Equestrian Center to Ohio due to Prince George's County COVID-19 pandemic restrictions. But this year, it is back at PGEC and is bigger than ever.

In the Beginning...

The Capital Challenge Horse Show was the brainchild of then show managers Oliver Kennedy and Billy Glass. "We had a show up at the Columbia Horse Center but it wasn't doing all that great," Kennedy remarked. "The barn could do better making money from lessons so we were looking for a place to move the show."

Right around the same time, Kennedy, a Maryland-native, got wind of a new equestrian center being built in Prince George's County. "We immediately contacted them and held our first show there in December 1993," Kennedy said. That first show was also the first event ever held at the newly constructed Prince George's Equestrian Center (PGEC).

The following year, the show was shifted to September with the intent of being a preview competition for the fall indoor circuit and was run over six days. "We thought we would just be a good prep for the fall indoors, but now we are the biggest show on the fall circuit," Kennedy added.

Over the years, the show has grown and is currently run over 10 days with Kennedy as the sole show manager. Twenty-eight years later, this year's show runs October 1-10 and is shaping up to be a big one. "We have the biggest wait list we have ever had," said Kennedy. "We currently have over 1,600 entries and will probably run about 1,400."

All About the Riders

With over 700 riders from all over the country competing each year, the competition at this show tends to be fierce. "We always have amazing competition," Kennedy remarked, adding, "Riders say it's the hardest show in the country to win at because of the level of competition. Scoring an 84 somewhere else often gets you the win but at our show, that might only be seventh place because of the level of competition."

Riders such as Carleton Brooks of Balmoral Farm in West Los Angeles, CA, have high regard for Capital Challenge, returning year after year with several horses and clients. Brooks, who is also a coach, clinician, trainer and rated judge, said, "it is the prestige of competing there that brings us back each year. The best of the best are there with the top [riders] fighting it out."

Brooks typically brings 10-15 horses from California for the East Coast competition circuit, with Capital Challenge being the first stop. "I like to think of it as the 'Triple Crown' of show hunters with Capital Challenge, Harrisburg, and Washington International," he said. This year however, Brooks is skipping the Washington International Horse Show and heading to Kentucky instead after the Pennsylvania Horse Show. "We love Washington when it's in D.C.... there is nothing like competing in the city like that... but we are going to Kentucky instead of Tryon this year."

Brooks added that competing in the indoor at PGEC is important to his training methods for its "coliseum feel." He explained, "The coliseum setting is really important for the industry as we are losing a lot of great indoors like that."

Pandemic Pandemonium

While most of the country had shut down early in 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic, it was looking like the Capital Challenge Horse Show could be held at PGEC in the Fall, under COVID-19 safety guidelines. Then on August 17, 2020, the show organizers announced that it would be moved to the World Equestrian Center in Ohio due to "Prince George's County Parks Department's tightened regulations surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic and its

decision to decrease the number of horses allowed at the facility."

Kennedy reported that his team had only four weeks to pack up everything from Maryland and get set up in Ohio. "Just pulling off the show last year was a huge feat," he said. "I don't know how we pulled it off. It's a testament to how good our staff is."

The pandemic also forced the cancellation of the Pennsylvania National Horse Show in Harrisburg, which moved the North American League Jumper Finals to Capital Challenge in Ohio. "The NAL finals [people] seem to like us so they will be part of this year's show too," Kennedy stated.

The pandemic has not finished wreaking havoc for 2021, as Kennedy is finding his normal supply chain crunched. "Rippeon Equipment has been part of the show nearly since day one and they supply our tractors for the show but they are having a hard time finding anything for us to use," Kennedy explained. "Tractors are in short supply and we are having a hard time finding any to rent either."

The ongoing pandemic is not going to slow Kennedy and his team down, however, as they put the finishing touches on the set up of this year's show.

Soldiering On

One of the reasons PGEC is so well-suited for a horse show this large is because of the number of rings they have available. Kennedy reports that during Equitation Weekend, there will be three competition rings going at once as well as two warm up areas. "The covered arena is primarily used for under saddle classes that weekend and then warm up for less busy days," he said.

Another key asset of PEGC is the number of permanent stalls and the ample room for temporary stabling. "We have used Brandywine Tent Company since the beginning," Kennedy explained, adding that around 1,000 horses and ponies are stabled on the grounds during the show.

Vendors have been invited back to PGEC this year with nearly 100% of the show's prepandemic vendors returning for 2021. "We will have vendors set up outside and inside and everyone is to follow the county's COVID protocols," Kennedy stated. These protocols include limiting the number of customers in booths and wearing face masks when indoors. "Plus there is all the standard stuff about self monitoring temperatures and such," he added.

Even though this year's show is shaping up to be business as usual, Kennedy is surprised at how big the show has become during the pandemic. "I'm shocked... with everything that is going on

in the world this year... it is just crazy how many people want to come to the show," he said while getting a bit choked up. "I'm super grateful that [the riders] like us. Not sure what it is about this show... but I'm just so very grateful."





The inaugural Maryland 5 Star at Fair Hill is set to make its spectacular debut, October 14-17, at the newly constructed Fair Hill Special Event Zone in Elkton, MD (Cecil County).

The Maryland 5 Star is one of only two 5 Star events in the United States and just the seventh worldwide, joining Eventing's other elite 5 star events at Badminton and Burghley in England; Luhmuhlen in Germany; Pau in France; Adelaide in Australia; and the Kentucky Three-Day Event in the U.S. The event's prestigious 5 Star (CCI5*) designation is the pinnacle of the Olympic sport of Eventing.

The four days of Eventing competition will feature Dressage (Thu-Fri), Cross-Country (Sat) and Show Jumping (Sun). In addition to the CCI5*-L, the event will feature a 3 Star level competition (CCI3*-L), which is serving as the USEF CCI3*-L Eventing National Championship, and The Dutta Corp. USEA Young Event Horse East Coast Championships Presented by Dubarry of Ireland.

Riders who competed in this year's Tokyo Olympic Games are expected to be on hand, including the full U.S. team of Phillip Dutton, Boyd Martin and Doug Payne, plus other Olympians such as Will Coleman and Lauren Kieffer Nicholson of the U.S., Clayton Fredericks of Australia, Jessica Phoenix of Canada, and 2004 individual Gold Medalist Leslie Law of Great Britain!

The event will also feature great shopping, demonstrations, concerts, kids activities, and the Maryland 5 Star Fresh Food Fest, produced in partnership with the Maryland Department of Agriculture (Sunday, October 17, 9:00 a.m. -2:00 p.m.). FAIR HILL: More than a 5*

As the international eventing scene shifts to Elkton and the inaugural Maryland 5 Star at Fair Hill this month, eyes around the world will be on the competitors and those working hard behind the scenes to put on the newest five-star on the FEI eventing calendar. Whether you are watching the live-stream feed from the comfort of your couch or cheering in person from the competition grounds, one thing worth noticing is the property itself: the Fair Hill Natural Resources Management Area.

This 5,656-acre park in Cecil County is much more than an eventer's playground. Managed by the Maryland Park Service of the Department of Natural Resources, Fair Hill is known for its open rolling hills, woodlands, and overall natural beauty. It is enjoyed by cyclists, hikers, and horseback riders year-round. The facility is home to the Cecil County Fair, the Fair Hill Races, Elk Creek Combined Driving Event, Foxcatcher Endurance Ride, and of course... Fair Hill International's multiple United States Eventing Association horse trials and starter trials. Starting this year, it is also home to the Maryland 5 Star at Fair Hill.

How did such an enormous park become the Fair Hill that it is today? Read on for the story of one horseman and his quest to build a sanctuary for fox chasing.

A Man With a Vision

Born in Surrey, England, in 1896 to Americans Annie Zinn (née Rogers) and William du Pont Sr., William du Pont Jr. was by profession a banker and businessman; his love of horses, fox chasing, and Thoroughbred racing, however, truly make up his legacy. The du Pont family moved back to the U.S. in 1902 and took up residence at the family's Virginia estate, Montpelier, once the home of the 4th U.S. President, James Madison. There, along with his sister Marion (who also became a Thoroughbred breeder and for whom the Equine Medical Center in Leesburg, VA is named), du Pont rode horses and raised champion foxhounds.

In 1919, du Pont married Jean Liseter Austin and the couple moved to Newtown Square, PA. They established Liseter Hall Farm where they bred and trained Thoroughbred racehorses under the name Springlawn Farm. The farm boasted the first indoor galloping track in the U.S. as well as an indoor arena, half-mile training track, breeding shed, hunter barn, show horse barn, and other outbuildings needed to run the large racing operation.

The du Ponts built a similar facility in Delaware, at Bellevue Hall, which William had inherited from his father. During this time, du Pont also began systematically purchasing land in Cecil County and around Liseter Hall in www.equiery.com | 800-244-9580 Pennsylvania. After du Pont and his first wife divorced in 1941, he moved to Bellevue Hall, which was close to his offices at the Delaware Trust Corporation.

Du Pont never lost his love of horses and hounds, and he began building a fox chaser's paradise at Fair Hill, the Cecil County lands he had purchased during the 1920s and 1930s. On the racing side of his businesses, du Pont built 23 racetracks in the US, including what are now Delaware Park and the steeplechase course at Fair Hill.

Building Fair Hill

Starting in the 1920s, du Pont purchased nearly 8,000 acres along the Maryland-Pennsylvania line. During the Great Depression, he increased his holdings by purchasing land from struggling local farmers and then offering them jobs and housing to allow them to continue to farm the lands. He also hired local residents to build fences, jumps, out buildings, and residences within the property.

Du Pont named the Maryland portion of his property Foxcatcher Farm and built another Thoroughbred racing stable there. One of the notable horses that came out of the Foxcatcher operation was 1938 Preakness Stakes winner Dauber.

Located within this section of the property, du Pont also built a turf course modeled after the renowned Aintree in England. He molded the land, planted and seeded it with high quality turf grass, and then let the turf develop for seven years before running horses over it. He even set aside around 400 acres of his Fair Hill property to grow sod grass to maintain the turf track.

The Foxcatcher National Cup debuted in 1934 and included 19 obstacles, the lowest of which was 4'8" and the highest of which was 6'4". Eventually, du Pont would hold two race meets each September. Now run as the Fair Hill Races each May, it is the only steeplechase meet in Maryland where parimutuel betting is offered. Du Pont's famed course recently received a facelift as part of the renovations of the new Fair Hill Special Event Zone. The race meet was suspended for 2020 and 2021 to let the new turf set properly.

In addition to the racing stables and steeplechase course, du Pont built a kennel and accommodations for his huntsman and staff so that he could move his pack of American Foxhounds up from Virginia to Fair Hill. This pack became the Foxcatcher Hounds. For most of the rest of his adult life, du Pont hunted three mornings a week from Fair Hill before heading to work at the bank. The kennels and barns are currently used by Fair Hill Stables.

To protect his hounds and territory, du Pont fenced in the perimeter of the 8,000 acres with *continued...*

a high chain link deer fence and took over the maintenance of public roads through the property in order to build many of the bridges and tunnels still used by horseback riders today.

A businessman to the core, du Pont also created a self-sufficient cattle operation at Fair Hill during World War II. He had the grassland for grazing cattle and making hay as well as the cropland to grow the grain needed to feed the cattle. He even built a grain mill, and silos and barns to store everything. He also created a gravity-fed watering system for the cattle and for an emergency fire system. Many of the bullpens and barns he had built are still standing and are rented out by DNR as turnout paddocks for horses.

Du Pont continued to purchase land through the 1950s. Eventually his aging body traded a horse for a Jeep so he could still follow his hounds. He died on December 31, 1965 at the age of 69.

Maryland Takes Over Fair Hill

In 1975, the estate of William du Pont Jr. sold the Maryland side of the property to the State of Maryland for \$6 million. The property was purchased using Open Space funds. George Strawbridge, a fox chaser, avid steeplechaser, and heir to the Campbell Soup Company, purchased the Pennsylvania portion of the property.

During sale negotiations, there was an informal agreement that fox chasing, the Fair Hill Races, the Cecil County Fair, and other small activities could continue on the property. There was not, however, a formal covenant requiring that equine activities remain part of Fair Hill's future. Luckily, the State saw the value of these activities and all are still going strong today.

In 2000, the management of the facility was moved to the Maryland Department of Natural Resources which worked alongside local officials to make Fair Hill a multi-use facility. Collaborating with hiking groups, cycling groups, and equestrian groups, DNR has repaired roads, bridges, buildings and overgrown trails within the park.

Equestrian use of the property was expanded in 1983 when the Fair Hill Training Center was built on 350 acres of the park. The training center was the vision of Thoroughbred trainer Dr. John Fisher who, along with investors and fellow trainers George Strawbridge and Gene Weymouth, signed a 98-year lease with DNR to build and run the facility.


The training center includes an all weather dirt track, Tapeta surface track, turf course, and 18 barns with 490 stalls. In addition, the training center also has on-site veterinarians and the Fair Hill Equine Therapy Center, which offers state-of-the-art rehabilitation and treatment options such as an AquaPacer and a Hyperbaric Oxygen Therapy chamber. Two Kentucky Derby winners (Barbaro in 2006 and Animal Kingdom in 2011) and one Belmont Stakes winner (Union Rags in 2012) have come out of the training center.

Endless Possibilities

The new Fair Hill Special Event Zone has created endless possibilities for additional activities at Fair Hill. The area, located in what was the steeplechase section of the park, now includes three all-weather competition arenas, a wider turf track and new cross-country jump complexes.

It is this section of the park that will serve as the main location for the Maryland 5 Star at Fair Hill. In order to maintain the rural and natural aspects of the park, all stabling, vendor tents and spectator seating will be brought in for the event and taken back out when the event has concluded.

The new world-class facility not only brings Fair Hill into the 21st century but also increases the value of Fair Hill and helps boost the economy of Cecil County and Maryland as a whole while preserving the history of this legendary property.



Maryland is proud to welcome America's Horse, the Mustang, on Maryland's portion of America's National Trail during October Horse Month.

Two Mustang-loving women from Montana, Hannah Catalino and Lisanne Fear, are riding 5,000 miles through 12 states with four Mustangs in one year, starting in late September at Lewes, Delaware, and then arriving in Maryland on October 2 at the Celebration of the Horse event at Tuckahoe Equestrian Center at Tuckahoe State Park in Queen Anne. The ride ends next October in San Francisco and is being filmed as a documentary by the EQUUS Film Festival.

These two riders want American horse people to think "Mustang" for their next horse. There are over 53,000 Mustangs in holding pens waiting for a home. The goal of the ride is to get 5,000 of them adopted.

Already in Maryland, Ann Hanlin from Street staged a Mustang Chal-

lenge Show last month in Harford County. Ann will be joining Hannah and Lisanne as they ride through Maryland. Other riders are welcome to join them as well.







When you visit **Jennifer Allen's** website, the first thing you notice is that EVERYONE at **J. Allen & Associates** is a horse person. So it comes as no surprise Allen's niche is accounting and bookkeeping services for equine-related businesses. Allen focuses on equine-related businesses "because we speak the same language. Clients that aren't involved with horses don't understand when you have to reschedule because the vet is coming out." Her practice is not, however, limited to equine-related businesses. A significant

portion of her client base is construction companies and contractors.

Allen launched her own business in 2017 after two decades in tax preparation and accounting. Allen's mother had told her to not pursue a career in the horse industry, but to instead pursue a career that would support her horse habit. Allen earned an undergraduate degree in finance and took a job with a mutual fund company. She picked up tax preparation work in her off hours to pay off her student loans more quickly. She was hooked. "No two tax returns are the same, not even a simple one with just a W-2. It's like a different puzzle each time." Allen went on to earn an MBA in accounting and became a Certified Public Accountant.

By 2003, Allen was working for Frederick County CPA Gary Smith, who is a long time horse person. In 2009, Allen began doing work with a few small businesses on the side, to help them grow. In 2011 she became an Endorsed Local Provider for the Dave Ramsey Show and her client base rapidly increased, as she specialized in helping clients get out of debt, and then, once out of debt, how to invest their funds going forward - in addition to assisting them with their taxes.

In 2017, Allen hung out her own accounting shingle by purchasing a small practice based in Damascus. Two years laters, her business received "Profit First Professionals" certification, which allowed her to move beyond compliance work into coaching clients on profit maximization and financial sustainability.

Allen considers her staff of horsewomen to be the engine of her business. She met **Tracy Barbeito** in 2005 when they both boarded horses at Woodvale Farm (Frederick), and she coaxed her to come into the industry. Barbeito prepares tax returns, does client bookkeeping, and handles numerous back-office duties. Allen met **Alicia Schwartzbeck**, who had a background in bookkeeping, when they were at Breezy Hill Stables (Thurmont).



Welcoming people to the family farm comes easy to new member **Kathy Stumpf**. Her father said "come to the farm" as frequently as "hello." Stumpf's family-run **Valley Meadow Farms Bed & Barn Trails Getaway** in Washington County on Sideling Hill, welcomes riders and their horses for a trails getaway. Riders can stay overnight in the farmhouse or visit for day rides. Stumpf grew up working alongside her father and as a result, she knows ev-

ery hill and valley, creek and view on the farm. She has created a 30mile trail system for guests to enjoy. Stumpf had owned and operated a florist shop in Middle River for 25 years before moving back to Sideling Hill. When she's not greeting guests, she is playing with her cows and chickens or gardening, and like her parents, she looks forward to welcoming Equiery readers and MHC members out for a visit.



One might consider **Clover Luck Stables** an "accidental stable." **Stephanie Williams** did not start out intending to have a lesson stable. It just sort of...happened. In a "lucky" sort of way.

When the Columbia Horse Center wound down its operations in 2018 and relocated to Woodland Horse Center, the Columbia Association brought Williams in to oversee the dispersal and sale of the lesson horses. She placed about 30 of the horses with private owners, and the remainder were slated to go to auction. Williams used her commissions to purchase the remaining horses, which now make up the majority of her 18-horse lesson barn. She could not accommodate her new herd in her four-stall Folly Quarter barn, so began leasing nearby properties.

When the pandemic arrived, Williams' theater closed down but her lesson program blossomed. Stephanie has consolidated Clover Luck Stables and is now operating out of Springhill Stables in Burtonsville while she and her life partner explore properties that would suit their business and personal needs. Despite the increased demand for riding lessons, Williams is committed to maintaining a low ratio of horses to clients. "[Our horses] work a maximum 5 days a week, though many are working less." She is also committed to bring riders in the show world. "We began attending local and rated hunter/jumper horse shows as a team this summer, and it is a delight to see our horses and riders working so well together." Her priority is "always on giving the horse the best experience possible. Though showing is something we enjoy, all of our riders understand that the main focus of our program is strong horsemanship and improving riding skills so that we can communicate with our horses more effectively."



The owners of Fox Lea Farm, originally a private farm in western Montgomery County, realized they had more stalls than they needed, so they did as so many others have done: they began taking in a few boarders eager to enjoy the facilities. They had space available, however, so **Patricia Milligan** (the horse person) and Michael Fox (the supportive husband) decided to look for a rescue horse. They found Owen, a sickly minia-

ture horse, and his buddy Bodhi, a miniature donkey. Thus was born the **Fox Lea Farm Mini Equine Rescue**.

Fox Lea is excited to host rides Hannah Catalino and Lisanne Fear for a clinic in October. The duo are riding Mustangs from Washington, D.C., to California along the American Discovery Trail to promote the adoption of wild mustangs. As we discussed in some detail in our Letter from the Presidents on page 7, and as Ross Peddicord, Executive Director of the Maryland Horse Industry Board, explains more comprehensively in his article on page 41, the goal of the Mustang ride is to get 5,000 of the 53,000 Mustangs currently in pens adopted.


